## Please explain how these funds will be used to provide a public benefit:

According to the International Dyslexia Association, dyslexia is a specific learning disability that is neurobiological in origin. It is characterized by difficulties with accurate and/or fluent word recognition and by poor spelling and decoding abilities. These difficulties typically result from a deficit in the phonological component of language that is often unexpected in relation to other cognitive abilities and the provision of effective classroom instruction. Secondary consequences may include problems in reading comprehension and reduced reading experience that can impede growth of vocabulary and background knowledge. Dyslexia affects about 1 in 5 students in South Carolina. People with dyslexia generally have average to above average IQs. When placed in the right environment they thrive. Many are entrepreneurial, highly skilled problem solvers, and contribute to their families and communities. In preliminary conversations with families in our recruiting region, finding and selecting an institution of higher education where students with dyslexia are supported in their transition to a less-structured academic learning environment while simultaneously shifting to a significantly different social and living experience is highly stressful. Many of the institutions in South Carolina have outstanding student support services, but few (only 1 in our preliminary research in 2022) offer a program which directly supports students with dyslexia. After an extremely successful pilot program, the college will use these funds to significantly grow the program, with the goal of supporting over 100 students per year by 2026-27. These funds help us scale up the program by adding academic coaches with expertise in working with students with dyslexia, professional development for our faculty and staff, direct academic support for students in the program.
